

## Examples of Loss of Timber Lands

Loss of Forest Lands from the Timber Land Inventory does not mean that the lands are developed. Property owners may remove timber lands from the inventory for a variety of purposes. Below are some examples.



The property in these photos was transferred from the Department of Natural Resources to a local school district after the trees were harvested. It is currently undeveloped. It is located near the city of Rainier.



The property at left was transferred from the State Department of Natural Resources to a private timber company between 2005 and 2010. The property has remained in the forest inventory.

This area of the county near McIntosh Lake was subdivided. Some of the lots were sold for rural development, while others remain in the forest land inventory.




The Fox Hill cluster subdivision retained around 160 acres in open space while accommodating rural growth. In the last 14 years, around 675 acres of forest lands have been protected in the resource parcels of rural cluster subdivisions.

The Riverwood subdivision is another example of a rural resource cluster subdivision. This subdivision was approved in 2007 and retained an 80-acre forest land resource tract.
