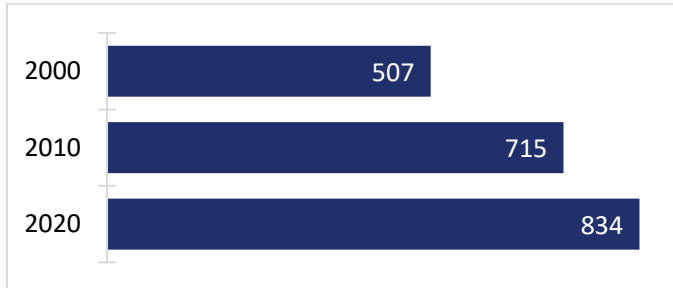

Reservation Population



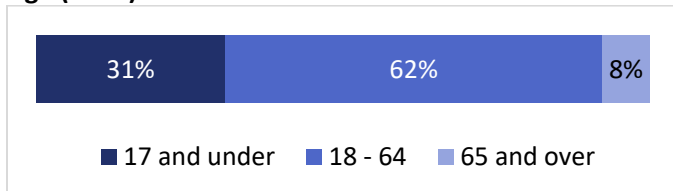

People of the River, People of the Grass

The Nisqually are descendants of the Southern Coastal Salish who lived in the Nisqually River Basin, on nearby prairies, and along the beaches of Puget Sound. Their name comes from "squalli," the grasses that grew in the lowland prairies.

The Nisqually were signatories of the Treaty of Medicine Creek, signed on December 26, 1854. The Indian War of 1855-56, and the Executive Order of January 20, 1857, resulted in the establishment of a 5,000 acre reservation along the Nisqually River.

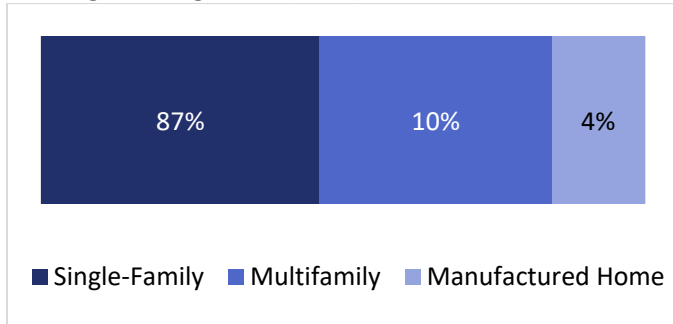
A large portion of the reservation (3,300 acres) was condemned when Fort Lewis was established in 1918, but a tribal acquisition program has returned over 1,600 acres of land to tribal ownership since 1975. The Nisqually adopted their constitution in 1946.

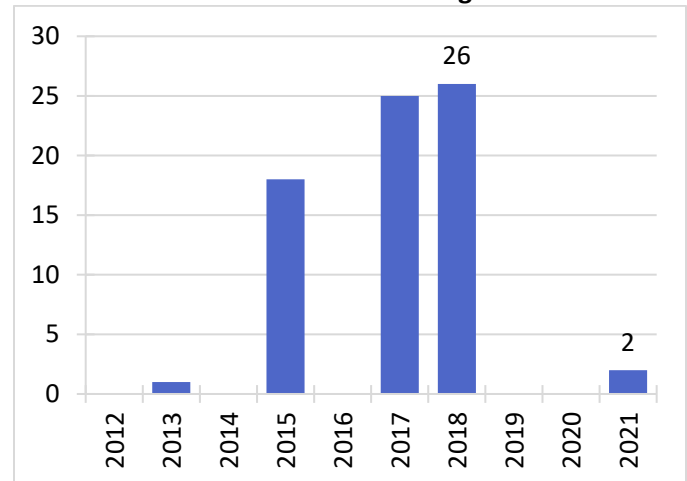

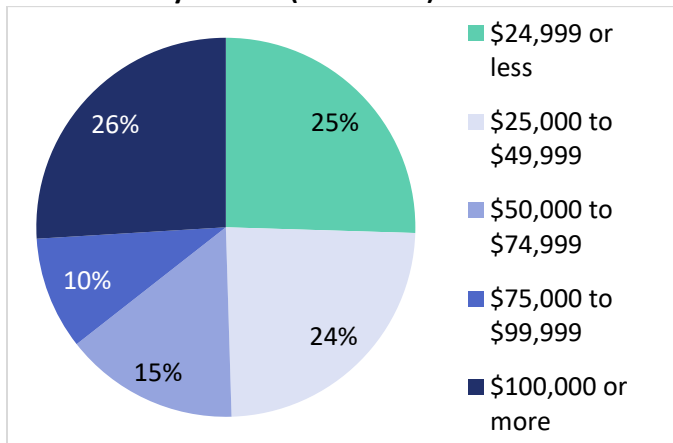

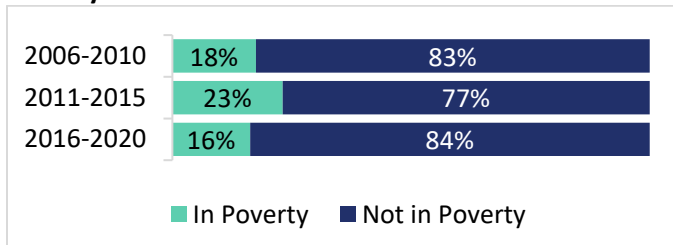
